Generally, these issues have either emerged from the baseline position papers or from prior informal consultation with a range of statutory consultees, council officials and Elected Members. In some instances, strategic issues have been identified through planning casework in dealing with planning applications. The priorities identified in the Corporate and Community Plans have also helped to define some of these issues.

NISRA, NINIS and Northern Ireland Strategic Migration Partnership data provide up to date data. The 2011 census showed that 32,000 (1.8%) of the usually resident population in Northern Ireland is from a minority ethnic background. Within the borough, the 2011 Census showed that 1.5% (2,300) were from a minority ethnic background. Across the borough this ranged from 5.2% in Loughview ward to 0.3% in Lisbane ward.
